Part II: Research, Teaching, and Clinical Contributions

A. Narrative report of Research, Teaching, and Clinical Contributions

My training as an EIS officer after residency formed the early foundation for my interest in research and infectious diseases. Working on Epidemic Investigations sparked my interest in answering the many "Why?s" that occur in both clinical care and public health. Until the past decade, however, my administrative and clinical responsibilities were primary, and most research efforts I was involved in focused on needs assessments to aid in grant writing, evaluation of prevention programs and health service delivery mechanisms, and were designed not to assess efficacy but effectiveness. My interest in

HIV care made me a co-investigator in the Pediatric AIDS Clinical Trials Group, and allowed me to participate in national scientific meetings, Adolescent Committee research agenda meetings, and protocol development. I have been local PI of 4 PACTG protocols in recent years.

Since 2001, I have been Principal Investigator of the Boston Unit of the Adolescent Trials Network for HIV/AIDS Interventions. The network, funded by NICHD, NIMH, and NIDA, is unique with a research agenda which includes clinical trials, treatment research, behavioral research for at risk and HIV-infected youth, and community-based research focusing on community mobilization and structural change. As a PI I have assembled and supervised a research team that has grown from 4 to more than 16 people, and have served as PI for 13 ATN protocols on site, 5 of which are still active. I have also had the privilege of serving for two years in the ATN's national leadership structure. As vice chair of both the ATN PI group and the ATN Executive Committee I have been able to join in reviewing proposed research concepts and funding proposals, developing and implementing a site performance system, and forming and training a consumer advisory board. As a protocol team member and PI for one of two ATN sites selected for ATN 032, a Social Network Intervention study which is the ATN's first primary prevention study, I have also opportunity to learn more about the complexities of multi-site behavioral research.

Locally, I have been a co-investigator on several subcontracts or non-local funded research projects, including two projects funded by CDC: PEP Surveillance for non-Occupational Exposure to HIV in Massachusetts; and a Project Assessing the use of Theory-Based Counseling integrating reproductive health with HIV and STD prevention. Local research collaborations for ATN and other research have been formed with BU School of Public Health, Fenway Community Health Center, Justice Resource Institute, and Boston Medical Center.

I have been involved in the teaching of pediatric residents since coming to Boston in 1986, when my role at Harvard Street included directing the primary care continuity experiences of the 6 pediatric and internal medicine residents placed there annually. At Children's, I precepted pediatric residents and fellows in their pediatric practices at Martha Eliot until 1993. I have precepted an adolescent medicine fellow weekly at Martha Eliot for several years, have mentored a first year medical student during the school year, and occasionally have precepted Med/Peds residents coming through the Martha Eliot Adolescent program as part of an elective block. In 2003, I served as a Primary Care Clinical preceptor for 3rd year medical students two days weekly. I also greatly enjoy teaching and precepting nurse practitioners, nurses and family planning personnel in interdisciplinary team settings. Most formal lectures and workshops and CME presentations have been done in the context of my HIV work, or as faculty for the MCH Leadership Education in Adolescent Health (LEAH) training program working with adolescent trainees. I serve as the Director of Community Programs for the LEAH grant. I have precept adolescent fellows (1 session weekly) for a 3 month rotation learning HIV care, and often teach the inpatient team working with our hospitalized patients with HIV. Currently I precept 3-6 residents and fellows in a weekly Adolescent

Medicine clinic within our Division, and am on-service for Division inpatients 4-5 weeks per year. I believe I have the ability to energize and engage an individual or an audience of several hundred people when teaching a topic I am passionate about. Detail of formal teaching commitments is displayed below.

My primary clinical interests, as a pediatrician and later as an adolescent medicine subspecialist, have centered on the care of urban youth, particularly youth of color and youth in high risk situations. My public health training and interest in systems of care and prevention, as well as my training and experience in infectious disease epidemiology early in my career, have also led to a growing interest in sexually transmitted infections and in HIV and AIDS prevention, case finding and care, as well in the area of youth development and prevention. My personal goals have always emphasized primary care, mentoring others with primary care and community health interests, and implementing successful community-based programs to improve health over clinical or basic science research. However, my work since 1990 in HIV case finding and care has brought an interest in developing better treatment regimens for youth living and dying with HIV. That interest has led to increasing involvement in national efforts to better understand the natural history of HIV infection in adolescents, to meet the challenges of designing care systems and clinical trials meeting youth's often desperate clinical needs while considering their developmental issues and challenges. Working as Principal Investigator for a large multicenter research network for the past 5 years, combined with my service as an IRB member, has increased not only my scientific accumen, but my ability to weigh the pros and cons of involvement in clinical and prevention research for youth at risk and the youth we serve who are living with HIV. Clinical contributions are discussed in detail in section E.
